Title IX

Under Title IX, schools are required to take prompt and effective action to address sexual harassment and sexual violence. Schools must have a process in place to investigate and resolve these incidents. Schools must also provide support and resources to students who have been affected by these incidents. Schools are also required to take steps to prevent future incidents and to create a safe and supportive environment for all students.

- Developing and implementing the school's Title IX policies and procedures.
- Investigating and resolving Title IX complaints.
- Providing support and resources to students who have been affected by Title IX incidents.
- Taking steps to prevent future Title IX incidents and to create a safe and supportive environment for all students.
- Monitoring and evaluating the school's Title IX policies and procedures.
- Reporting Title IX incidents to the Department of Education.
- Providing training and education to students and staff on Title IX.
- Maintaining records of Title IX incidents.
- Collaborating with other schools and organizations to address Title IX issues.
- Staying up-to-date on Title IX laws and regulations.



Education, Awareness Programming, and Training

Education

Title IX for Graduate Students:

As a graduate student, you are responsible for understanding and complying with Title IX regulations. This includes reporting any incidents of sexual harassment or violence to the appropriate authorities. It is important to be aware of your rights and the resources available to you. You should also be aware of the consequences of sexual harassment and violence, which can be severe. 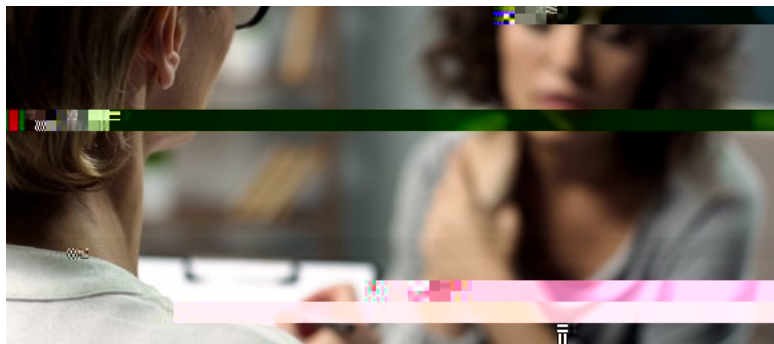

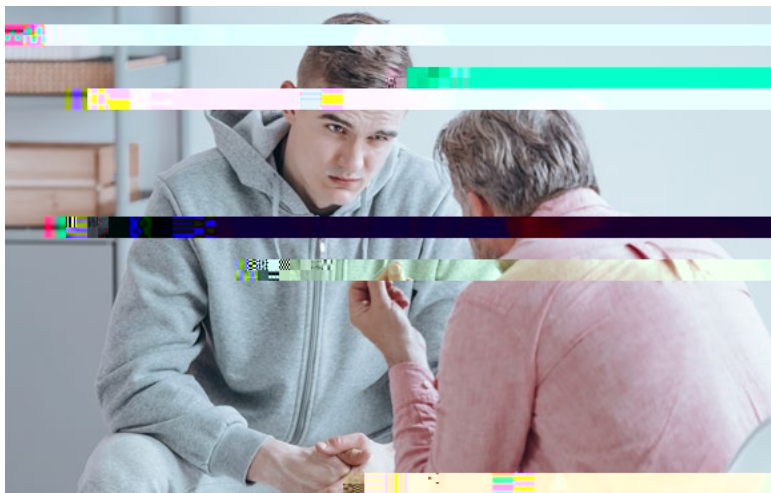
